My Advice for 2021: 'Don't Worry, Be Happy!' A lot of people long for a crystal ball. They desperately want to know what is going to happen in the future. As for me, I'll pass, and instead take things one day at a time. I've not always felt this way, but if 2020 has taught me anything, it's that I probably would rather not know what lies ahead. In fact, Scripture counsels us in that regard in the well-known passage from the sixth chapter of the Gospel of

"Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life?"

Matthew in which Jesus says...

Jesus goes on to expound on the carefree nature of nature itself. He concludes by encouraging us not to worry about tomorrow because "each day has enough trouble of its own." In other words, let's deal with today first; then we'll focus on tomorrow. Plan for the future, but live for today.

Reggae artist Bob Marley expressed a similar sentiment in 1988 with his catchy tune, "Don't Worry, Be Happy," which won the Grammy Award for Song of the Year. His simple lyrics express a lighthearted and carefree tone as he sings...

"Now there, is this song I wrote
I hope you learned note for note
Like good little children, don't worry, be happy
Now listen to what I said, in your life expect
some trouble

When you worry you make it double
But don't worry, be happy, be happy now."

Jesus knew that we would face trials and
tribulations throughout our life, but he did not
intend for us to be burdened by worry. Instead,

he called us to be resilient, upbeat, and above all, faithful. We are wise to live on the bright side and lift up others in the process.

I think I will make a more serious attempt to follow the advice of Jesus and Bob Marley in 2021. After all, what do I have to lose?

Instead, I will focus more on the things I can control, like my words and actions, how I spend my time, and how I serve the Lord by serving others.

People are clearly more tense and more angry these days, and the events of 2020, namely the coronavirus and the bitter Presidential election, have had a profound effect on our perilous disposition. We hope most of that will be behind us and that we can move forward with renewed hope and optimism in the coming year.

Food Pantry

Thanks to everyone for the wonderful support of our food pantry! It is serving the community every single day! How exciting! As the weather turns cold, we will be transitioning the pantry to dry goods, so that we don't have to worry about food freezing in the frigid temperatures. We will still have canned goods available for pick up inside, but the outside food should be more weather-proof. Here are some examples of foods that would be appropriate to donate for the outdoor part of the pantry.

Boxed mashed potatoes Rice side-dish packets

Macaroni & Cheese Dry milk
Pancake mix Ramen noodles
Muffin mix Cake mix

Cereal Instant oatmeal Hot chocolate mix Crackers

Personal hygiene items

Peanut butter & jelly (in plastic only)

Pancake syrup (in plastic only)

Soup mixes such as Lipton or Bear Creek (at RKO)

As a reminder, we cannot accept anything that is not in tamper-resistant packaging, such as bulk food store items that are bagged and twist-tied. We also cannot take perishable goods. Financial News:

Tithes and Offerings needed each Sunday for budgeted expenses (November 2020): \$1,496

Received last month: 11/01 -\$2,401 11/08 - \$2,180 11/15 - \$1,610 11/22 -11/29 - \$443 962

As of 11/30/2020, we received about 102% of our budgeted income for the month of November and 83% YTD. Our recent monthly donations continue to improve our YTD performance. On top of that, we received \$225 for the Salvation Army (in lieu of bell ringing), \$465 for the Food Pantry and \$2,300 for livestreaming equipment. Oak Chapel is alive and well!

Note: We have two other ongoing unbudgeted projects that are available for donations: \$2,300 for sanctuary audio upgrade in conjunction with the theft replacements and \$1,400 for the surveillance cameras installation.

- The process to build the 2021 zero-based budget was the same as in the past. This budget has several noticeable financial changes (in comparison to 2020).
- 1. There's a \$3,486 (3.2%) increase in the budget, resulting from the following changes:
 - a. Apportionments decreased by \$903.
 - b. AV Equipment decreased by \$1,000 (microphones were replaced as part of the burglary).
 - c. SPRC Staff Recognition increased by \$599 to provide a stipend for JJ Cline.
 - d. Parsonage Capital Expense decreased by \$8,500, leaving \$0 budgeted for 2021.
 - e. Church Capital Expense increased by \$4,500 for parking lot resealing and repainting. We have been setting aside funds for this expense, so we should have adequate funds on hand for this project.

Special Tax Deduction

The CARES Act of 2020 includes a special tax deduction of up to \$300 for 2020 cash donations to qualifying charities. This is for taxpayers who use the standard deduction, which is most of us. The deduction lowers both adjusted gross income and taxable income. Standard recordkeeping requirements apply.

- f. \$1M Umbrella Insurance Policy added; liability premium increased by \$312.
- g. Parsonage Maintenance Expense reduced by \$500.
- h. Church Maintenance Expense reduced by \$2,200.
- i. Church Internet/Safeguard Security increased by \$360 to provide a Fiber Internet connection for livestreaming and by \$410 to provide alarm monitoring for the security system.
- j. Parsonage heating and cooling systems and hot water heater were replaced between tenant occupancy. As reported last year, the boiler was on its last leg. The parsonage now has a high efficiency heat pump. The project funds were fronted by internal funds, which will be replenished at a rate of about \$600 per month from the net parsonage rent. These are repairs/improvements that would be needed even if the parsonage was still occupied by our pastor. The difference is that we have restricted rental income to help pay for these repair/improvements.
- k. The Trustees requested a \$250 per month set aside fund to repair the church roof at some point down the road.
- 2. FNB Properties LLC (formerly Swift Auto) is not interested in participating in a Fair Parking Fundraiser.
- 3. Everything else is about the same as previous years.
